Pen-y-ffordd is an active village community, set in rolling countryside, just inside the Welsh border, where the land rises up from Cheshire. It includes Penymynydd, which has long since been absorbed and Dobshill.

This border walk crosses the disused railway line which was closed in 1962 because the diesel engines were unable to climb the hill to Pen-y-ffordd up one of the steepest railway gradients in the country.



#### On the Farm

Look out for many horses, cattle and sheep on your walk. The village is popular for riding stables



#### Birdlife

There are Buzzards, Tawny and Barn Owls, Lapwings in season, Goldfinches, Bullfinches, Heron and Kingfisher have been seen along Blackbrook.



### Flora and Fauna

Oak, Beech, Hornbeam, Willow, Poplar, Hawthorn, Blackthorn, Bluebells, Sloe Berries...

# History

Today a cluster of 34 houses in the field east of Vounog Hill was once a grand house called Fownog Hall, that became Meadowslea hospital before the Great War and continued as a much loved Cottage Hospital until it was demolished in 2008.


# **Getting Here**

#### By Rail

Pen-y-ffordd station is on the Wrexham-Bidston line. Alight at Pen-y-ffordd station. Cross the roundabout and walk along Corwen Road / Rhos Road, past the Red Lion pub. Turn right at the T-Junction and start the circular walk at number 2, opposite Meadow View.

## By Car

The A550 links Penyffordd to the A55 North Wales Expressway. Coming from the Expressway, you will go straight across 3 roundabouts, then take the next left, signposted Penyffordd, and immediately right into Platt Lane, where there is space to park.

8 With the magestic trees guarding Nant Farm marking the entrance, walk up Platt Lane to return to the start of the walk.
